

FANTASTIC GEOGENRE

Ist Meeting of European Female Filmmakers Specializing in the Fantastic Genre

OCTOBER 6TH-7TH 2023



In 2021, the Sitges International Film Festival of Catalonia Foundation designed the WomanInFan program with the aim of contributing to achieving gender parity within fantastic filmmaking. The creative leadership position of female filmmakers has historically always been inferior, but in the case of the fantastic genre, the situation is far worse. One of the explanations put forward by film historians points to the cultural and social patterns that prevail in the film industry and that have identified certain productions as alien to female sensibilities. As such, projects belonging to the horror, science fiction, action or thriller genres, for example, have been entrusted mostly to men. Although this industry trend is underlined by the female filmmakers themselves who have not identified fantastic as a genre within their reach.

After the **WomanInFan** program's two years of international experience, we have also detected that the situation of women in fantastic genre filmmaking differs enormously from one territory to another and, of course, points to a clear inferiority of European production compared to North American or Ibero-American, for example.

In 2023, WomanInFan focuses on storytelling, in other words, the creation of narratives and film imaginaries by creative women. Within this line we propose a first meeting of European women directors and/or screenwriters who expose their industrial, social and cultural context as a reflection of their national filmographies. The personal testimony of these filmmakers should be accompanied by that of historians who can establish a historical starting point, and that of cinematic promotion and/or education institutions from the respective countries, presenting historical data in order to obtain useful conclusions for designing future actions.



The MaestrAs. Encounter with Mary Lambert

Mary Lambert, who will be receiving the Time Machine Award this year, is a graduate of the prestigious Rhode Island School of Design, where she studied fine art. As a filmmaker, she applied her sensitivity to innovative work on music videos for Madonna, Janet Jackson, Eurythmics and many other icons of the era, helping to fuel the MTV revolution. Her visual imprint led to the hallucinogenic, dreamlike landscapes in her first feature film, the cult classic Siesta, for which she received an Independent Spirit Award nomination for Best Debut Feature. Lambert is perhaps best known for directing the first Stephen King adaptation, Pet Sematary (1989). It proved to be a huge box office sensation, reaching #1, and spawning a sequel, Pet Sematary II (1992). A prolific director who isn't afraid to approach diverse mediums and genres. Lambert has directed everything from horror to animation. Today, Pet Sematary continues to be the most successful genre film directed by a woman.
